
















The 125-year old Smith Opera House is one of the oldest operating performing arts theaters in the U.S. and is recognized by the National Register of Historic Places. Called an "architectural gem" by The New York Times and the Smithsonian, The Smith has presented a wide variety of performances, from burlesque to Bruce Springsteen. Through classic films on the largest screen in the Finger Lakes, the ArtSmart schoolkids' series for young audiences, and the Smith's Jan Regan Club Series, The Smith seeks to program something for everyone in our diverse community. The Smith is the cultural anchor of community life for Geneva and surroundings, featuring local performances, hosting meetings, and cheering area students as they cross our stage each June for their high school graduations.

The Smith partners with multiple local cultural organizations to provide a "home" for their productions. The Geneva Theatre Guild and Geneva Light Opera present their work on The Smith stage as well as several dance studios that serve the region's children. The Smith presents music concerts in multiple styles and genres and partners with regional promoters to bring internationally known artists to the region. Attendance at these performances range from 100 patrons to a "sold out" 1408!

# SMITH CENTER FOR THE ARTS 2018

#### VOLUNTEERS We couldn't do it without our volunteers.

75+ Event Volunteers provide key services and connections to Smith patrons by selling food, drink, tickets and artist merchandise, helping patrons to their seats, scanning tickets and handing out programs. At sold-out events, such as June 2018's Judy Collins-Stephen Stills concert, The Smith had as many as 30 volunteers on hand to ensure the best audience experience possible.

In 2018, non-Board Member volunteers donated more than 1000 hours to The Smith. At minimum wage, the value of that work is \$10,400.

"I have been a volunteer at the Smith since June 2016. I volunteer at the Smith because it is essential that our community experience cultural diversity through the arts. While I am not able to financially contribute at this time, I can offer my time in helping the Smith succeed. In my time, I have seen a Christian comedian, a lesbian singer, children's programs, the RPO, an Irish group, a rap singer, and, most recently, the Mersey Beatles from England. I take pride in volunteering at the Smith, and I encourage others to contribute."

The Smith's 15 volunteer Board members and additional Board committee members provide invaluable expertise in areas including strategic and financial planning, fundraising and grant management, and legal services.

#### PROGRAMMING

The main source of The Smith's income is its programming and associated services such as concessions and bar sales. In 2018:

**43 films** brought in just shy of **2,000 patrons** Films were as diverse as the topical documentary, *Trashed*, and the family favorite *The Polar Express*, complete with a visit from Santa.

**17 live performances** brought in more than **9,000 patrons** 

**3** Jan Regan Club Series events brought in just under **200 patrons** (The Smith's Jan Regan Club Series invites the public to experience live performances in smaller, more intimate venues in and around Geneva.)

# **6** ArtSmart events brought in more than **3,300** area children and their teachers to the theatre.

ArtSmart performances included a stage adaptation of Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby* for high school students and *Charlotte's Web* for the under-8 year old set.

The Smith partners with a variety of promoters, including DSP Shows, to bring national tours to Geneva. Spring 2018, The Smith had a packed concert schedule, hosting, among others, performances by Lyle Lovett and Shawn Colvin, The Decemberists, The Cowboy Junkies, Gordon Lightfoot, Robert Cray, and aforementioned legends, Stills and Collins.

The Smith is available for rental and regularly hosts groups presenting concerts, films, meetings, graduations and speakers. In 2018, The Smith rounded out its repertoire by hosting a congressional candidates' debate and a wedding.

The Smith was the recipient of funding to develop film and live performance programming that supported Geneva's Pride Festival (June) and Festival Latino (September). These events had the benefit of developing new audiences while amplifying existing community celebrations.

The Smith maintains a close relationship with Hobart and William Smith Colleges, hosting the Colleges' new student orientation, screening films that develop themes of academic courses, and employing student interns.

### FUNDRAISING

The Smith relies on contributed income and employs the following strategies to raise it:


**Annual Membership Drive.** Members join at levels ranging from \$60 to \$1,000 and receive benefits such as free movie passes and beverage tickets. In 2018, the membership drive raised \$38,095, up almost 30% from 2017 membership donations.

**Annual Support,** includes unrestricted gifts and online fundraising campaigns such as NYGives and ROC the Day. The Smith raised \$30,493 in 2018.

**Show Sponsorships.** Local businesses such as Lyons National Bank and Bank of the Finger Lakes gain valuable exposure for their businesses by sponsoring films and live performances.

#### Foundation and Government

**Grants.** Grants from organizations such as The Williams Family Foundation and the Max and Marian Farash Charitable Foundation as well as support from the City of Geneva and the Town of Geneva are important sources of programming and project dollars for The Smith. Grant income in 2018 totaled \$60,000.





As The Smith continues to bring more events of relevance to regional audiences, staff will be added in areas of audience services, fundraising, and building maintenance.

The Smith will prioritize collaboration with downtown Geneva businesses, the Geneva Business Improvement District, and local and regional tourism organizations to bring visitors to our growing city.
